Description Approximate frequentist inference for generalized linear mixed model analysis with expectation propagation used to circumvent the need for multivariate integration. In this version, the random effects can be any reasonable dimension. However, only probit mixed models with one level of nesting are supported. The methodology is described in Hall, Johnstone, Ormerod, Wand and Yu (2018) <[doi:10.48550/arXiv.1805.08423v1](https://doi.org/10.48550/arXiv.1805.08423v1)>.

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`glmmEP`*Approximate frequentist inference for generalized linear mixed models via expectation propagation.*

Description

The machine learning paradigm known as expectation propagation, typically used for approximation inference in Bayesian graphical models contexts, is adapted to the problem of frequentist inference in generalized linear mixed model analysis. The essence is rapid approximation evaluation of the log-likelihood surface by using expectation propagation projections onto the Multivariate Normal family that circumvent the need for numerical integration. The approach applies to any reasonable dimension of the random effects vector, but currently is limited to probit mixed models with one level of nesting. The reference below provides full details.

<code>Xrandom</code>	Matrix with columns consisting of predictors that enter the model as random effects. Each entry of the first column must equal the number 1 corresponding to the random effects intercept.
<code>idNum</code>	Vector containing group membership identification numbers.
<code>control</code>	Function for controlling convergence and other specifications.

Description

Function for optional use in calls to `glmmEP()` to control convergence values and other specifications for expectation propagation-based fitting of generalized linear mixed models.

Arguments

confLev	Confidence level of confidence intervals expressed as a proportion (i.e. a number between 0 and 1). The default is 0.95 corresponding to 95% confidence intervals.

BFGSmaxit	Positive integer specifying the maximum number of iterations in the Broyden-Fletcher-Goldfarb-Shanno optimization phase. The default is 500.
BFGSreltol	Positive number specifying the relative tolerance value as defined in the R function <code>optim()</code> in the Broyden-Fletcher-Goldfarb-Shanno optimization phase. The default is 1e-10.
EPmaxit	Positive integer specifying the maximum number of iterations in the expectation propagation message passing iterations. The default is 100.
EPreltol	Positive number specifying the relative tolerance value for the expectation propagation message passing iterations. The default is 1e-5.
NMmaxit	Positive integer specifying the maximum number of iterations in the Nelder-Mead optimization phase. The default is 100.
NMreltol	Positive number specifying the relative tolerance value as defined in the R function <code>optim()</code> in the Nelder-Mead optimization phase. The default is 1e-10.
quiet	Flag for specifying whether or not <code>glmmEP()</code> runs ‘quietly’ or with progress reports printed to the screen. The default is FALSE.
preTransfData	Flag for specifying whether or not the predictor data are pre-transformed to the unit interval for fitting, with estimates, predictions and confidence intervals transformed to match the units of the original data before. The default is TRUE.

Value

A list containing values of each of the fifteen control parameters, packaged to supply the control argument to `glmmEP`. The values for `glmmEP.control` can be specified in the call to `glmmEP`.

Description

Section 4.1.2 of the refence below describes a simulation study with data generated from a probit mixed model with six fixed effects parameters and a bivariate random effects vector having a 2 by 2 symmetric positive definite covariance matrix. The function simulates a data set from this model with 2500 groups and the number of observation in each group being a random draw from 20,21,...,30.
