**Title** Calculate and Plot ICER

**Description** The app will calculate the ICER (incremental cost-effectiveness ratio) Rawlins (2012) <[doi:10.1016/B978-0-7020-4084-9.00044-6](https://doi.org/10.1016/B978-0-7020-4084-9.00044-6)> from the mean costs and quality-adjusted life years (QALY) Torrance and Feeny (2009) <[doi:10.1017/S0266462300008461](https://doi.org/10.1017/S0266462300008461)> for a set of treatment options, and draw the efficiency frontier in the costs-effectiveness plane. The app automatically identifies and excludes dominated and extended-dominated options from the ICER calculation.
